GENERAL RULES - FFA SHOW

1. All animals shall be housed in the livestock buildings.
2. Any active FFA member in good standing may exhibit
3. All animals exhibited have been owned by and cared for by the exhibitor, not less than 60 days prior to entry. Exhibitors may be called to produce proof of ownership, breed classification will be determined by the division superintendent.
4. No animals may be entered in more than one class, except pens or special breed classes.
5. A member may receive a premium on a maximum of two animal entries per class.
6. Each exhibitor is responsible for his own animal's feeding, watering, and other care. Bring your own feed, bedding, and water containers. Sawdust is only allowed for bedding. Dairy Exhibitors ONLY are allowed to use straw bedding.
7. All entries must be entered by 8 pm Wednesday and cannot be removed prior to 6 pm on Sunday.
8. All animals will receive a clinical inspection upon arrival.
9. All animals entered will be available for use in the judging contest.
10. Individual premiums, provided by Marion County Fair, will be paid only for entries listed in this book. Payment will be mailed to the local chapters. This is subject to change.
11. An individual must enter one class of showmanship if showing large and small animals. If showing just small animals, (example: poultry and rabbits) members must show in both classes of showmanship. Must use an animal owned by the individual, which must have been shown in a conformation or market class.
12. All market lambs must be shorn within seven days prior to the final weigh-in and have no more than $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of wool.
13. Champion and Reserve Rosettes will be presented at the discretion of the judge.
14. Market animals may be weighed only once.
15. Points will be awarded and converted into money after all other fair bills and expenses have been paid.
16. All Nursery and Ornamental Horticulture entries must be identified by class prior to entry. One entry per class per individual or chapter. All class project entries must be identified with the name of the individual who performed the skill or technique.
17. At the judge's discretion, a first place award may not be given.
18. Register immediately following unloading.

19. Official FFA Dress for the County Fair will be: White shirt/blouse, official FFA tie/scarf, and official FFA jacket zipped to the top. Black pants/slacks or jeans and dark shoes. White pants/slacks are strongly encouraged for goat and dairy exhibitors. (Judges have the authority to omit the wearing of FFA jackets depending on the weather.) (OFFICIAL DRESS IS REQUIRED TO BE WORN AT THE AWARDS PROGRAM. Many pictures are taken of award winners that are sent to donors and newspapers. Members not in official dress will not be allowed on stage at the Awards Program).
20. The Round Robin Champion is ineligible for that award in subsequent years. He may compete for premiums where offered and is also eligible for awards in other divisions. If he is champion showmanship in the class the next year, the Reserve Champion shall lead out to compete for the trophy.
21. All animals to be exhibited in market classes must be weighed at regular weigh-ins.
22. Superintendents and/or chapter advisors will withhold premiums for infractions of the general rules.
23. Premiums will be withheld from any Livestock Exhibitor who does any of the following;
 - a. Fails to show his own livestock in the Showmanship Class.
 - b. The use or possession of alcohol or illegal drugs in any form. The use of any tobacco products or other controlled substances.
 - c. Fails to complete herdsmanship requirements.
 - d. Do not participate in Sunday Fair Cleanup.
24. FFA members & Advisors are responsible for the cleanup of all show rings, pens (4-H cleans their pens, but we must make sure they are clean), and open class areas at the end of the fair. Failure to participate may result in the reduction of premiums.
25. Market steers must be dehorned.
26. All manure & bedding are to be removed from the barn by 8 am
27. All livestock exhibits must be clean and manageable.
28. All Tack Pens, including grooming chutes, sheep trim stands, etc. must be marked by Chapter Name.
29. If any animal or poultry is removed for any reason, the FFA superintendent must be informed and an Animal Release Form must be completely filled out and on file at the Livestock Office before removing the animal or poultry from the fairgrounds.
30. Any question of judgment or interpretation of the rules not specifically covered by the above rules shall be governed by the FFA Superintendents. Their decisions shall be final.

31. If for ANY reason your animal or poultry needs medical treatment, a Medical Treatment Form must be completely filled out and on file at the Livestock Office.
32. Pens must be cleaned out at the time of animal release.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITORS GENERAL **REQUIREMENTS**

1. A clinical inspection will be made for all animals and poultry showing clinical evidence of disease may be refused entry.
2. Diseased animals must be removed from the fairgrounds.
3. Animals and poultry affected with warts, ringworm, or other skin conditions or unsightly blemishes will be refused entry into the fairgrounds or removed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the veterinarian or his representative.
4. Animals and poultry which develop a disease condition during the course of the fair are to be removed from the premises and returned to the farm of origin or otherwise dispose of.
5. By entering your animal in the fair, you are giving consent to the barn superintendent and the Fair board to contact a veterinarian for emergency services. The owner will be responsible for any fees sustained in the effort to diagnose or treat an animal.

MARION COUNTY JUNIOR LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION ANIMAL QUALIFICATIONS

- A. All sale animals must be shown by their owners unless excused by the MCJLA.
- B. All animals that are tagged as market animals and meet the requirements of these rules must show in a market class.
- C. Steers weighing 1451 lbs to 1500 lbs. will be auctioned at 1450 lbs. to the buyers; members will be paid for 1450 lbs. Hogs weighing 286 lbs to 300 lbs. will be auctioned at 285 lbs. to buyers; members will be paid for 285 lbs.
- D. Only animals that meet the requirements for each species will be accepted into the market animal classes. In order to qualify for the auction the following live evaluation and weight requirements must be met:
 - 1. Market Steers: Blue or red award; minimum weight of 1100 lbs. and maximum weight of 1500 lbs. at Final Weigh-In
 - 2. Market Lambs: Blue or red awards; minimum weight of 105 lbs. and maximum weight of 160 lbs at Final Weigh-in. Sheep MUST be shorn within seven days prior to Final Weigh-in and have no more than a ¼ inch of wool.
 - 3. Market Hogs: Blue or red awards; minimum weight of 225 lbs. and maximum weight of 300 lbs. at Final Weigh-In.
 - 4. Market Goats (Wethers and Doelings): Blue or red award; minimum weight of 60 lbs. and maximum weight of 110 lbs. at Final Weigh- in.
 - 5. Market Rabbits: Pen of three fryers, 4 – 5 ½ lbs. each, under 75 days of age (Blue Awards only). Registration for market rabbits will occur on Wednesday night at the Marion County Fair and will have a permanent tattoo in the left ear.
 - 6. Market Poultry: Pen of three broiler/fryers, 4+ lbs. and no more than 50 days of age (Blue Awards only).
 - 7. Market Turkeys: One hen or tom between 16 and 18 weeks of age. Hens must weigh at least 13 lbs and toms must weigh at least 20 lbs. (Blue Awards only).

SECTION 1 - SHOWMANSHIP

Round Robin :

1. The Advanced Champion Showman of each species (Sheep, Meat Goat, Dairy Goat, Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Swine, and Llama) will then compete for the Advanced Round Robin Showmanship Award.
2. The Novice Champion Showman of each species (Sheep, Meat Goat, Dairy Goat, Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Swine, and Llama) will then compete for the Novice Round Robin Showmanship Award.
3. Animals used in the Round Robin Livestock Showmanship Contest must have previously been shown in a Showmanship class and be of the same age group whenever possible.
4. Each participant for the FFA Grand Champion Showmanship Award will show six animals in addition to their own. Showman will be responsible for providing their own animal on the day of the event for round-robin. In the case that the champion advance and novice showmanship animal becomes fatigued another animal may be selected at the discretion of the FFA Advisor Superintendent for that species.
5. Each species superintendent will be responsible for managing their species show ring during the round-robin.

General Showmanship

6. Members exhibiting livestock are required to make an entry for the showmanship award in at least one division their livestock is entered.
7. Members who exhibit livestock and poultry/rabbits are required to show in a showmanship class for both areas.
8. A showmanship entry may be made for each kind of livestock entered. Animals to be shown in the showmanship class must have been shown in a confirmation class at which time the Superintendent or the Judge may eliminate a showmanship entry from the showmanship competition.
9. Showmanship class is divided into Novice and Advanced Showmen.
 - a. Novice Showmen include exhibitors with no experience prior to the start of the school year prior to the county fair (including 4-H, Open Class) exhibiting that species.
 - b. Advanced Showmen include exhibitors who have had experience (including 4-H, Open Class) exhibiting with that specific species.
 - c. If entries total more than 15 in each Division, superintendents will split entries into two or more classes.

10. The first and second place winners in each showmanship class, unless otherwise determined by the judge of each species, will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion Showmen for each species.

Showmanship Scoring Factors

1. The appearance of a showman (neat, clean, properly dressed)
2. Poise, promptness, calmness, alertness, and attitude of showman
3. Skill in showing the animal, including
 - a. Continuous attention while showing
 - b. Controlling and keeping animals
 - c. Ability to move animal as requested by judge
4. The Animal
 - a. Condition (fleshing)
 - b. Clean
 - c. Brushing and curling
 - d. Clipping and brushing
 - e. Feet and horns
 - f. Condition of equipment
5. 5. General Knowledge

SECTION 2 - HERDSMANSHIP

General Guidelines:

1. Herdsmanship will be scored two times daily.
2. Exhibitors & Chapters will be scored based on the factors below.
3. Chapters will receive a combined ranking of Blue, Red, or White herdsmanship daily.
4. The blue ranking chapters in each species will be announced at the morning FFA Meeting.
 - a. Daily rankings will be posted in the barn for each species.
5. Awards will be given to the top chapter of each species.

Herdsmanship Scoring Factors

1. The Exhibitor - including
 - a. Appearance, neat, clean, and properly dressed
 - b. Cooperativeness with fellow exhibitors and those in charge (c) manner, degree, promptness in carrying out responsibilities (d) general attitude and conduct
2. Care of animals
 - a. Animals held in pens for best effect
 - b. Animals well cared for
 - i. Animals are kept clean at all times
 - ii. Adequate bedding used
 - iii. Animals fed & watered regularly
 - iv. Blankets used properly.
3. Care of stalls, pens, and aisles;
 - a. Exhibitor card displayed, fully and neatly completed
 - b. Equipment kept in show boxes
 - c. Feed kept in feed aisle, not on top of pen
 - d. Stalls/pens kept clean & dry - STRIPPED/REBEDDED DAILY!
 - e. Aisles are kept clean and free for spectators
 - f. Large equipment & tack areas labeled with exhibitor's name & chapter, and no for sale signs exhibited on pens or stalls.

DIVISION 160 NURSERY

Each plant to be displayed in a separate identical commercial type container. A single cultivar may be used only once except in Nursery Exhibit, Class 11.

FLOWER HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS

1. Cut flowers in the late afternoon the day before, or early in the morning the day of the show; put them immediately in deep lukewarm water. Keep out of drafts, in a dark place.

2. Select material in its prime and make sure it is pest-free.
3. Name varieties if possible.
4. Roses should have a healthy stem, shown with foliage, and blooms should be one-third to one-half open.
5. Disbud tea roses.
6. Gladioli should have five to seven florets open, long stiff, straight stems, and one leaf.
7. Dahlias should have two leaves, no buds, and centers should show, only in single or collarette varieties.
8. When exhibiting two or more blooms, all should be the same size.

LANDSCAPE EXHIBIT

DIVISION 170 LANDSCAPE DESIGN EXHIBIT

General Guidelines

1. The theme will be the same as the County Fair theme. Themes must be posted by the exhibit and on the design diagram.
2. To consist of a plan drawn to scale on 18" x 24" CDC or blueprint paper. The plans are to be given to the Superintendent in charge of this Division at the completion of the exhibit but before the official judging time.
3. To be the work of one or more members of the Chapter. Adult involvement is to be limited to instruction and counsel, or premium money will be withheld.
4. The exhibit plan is to be drawn to scale 1" = 1'. The scale used must be shown on the plans. The name of the Chapter is to be shown on the bottom right-hand side of the sheet. Plants are to be keyed using any standard format.
5. Exhibitors will be responsible for providing all needed material for the exhibit, including a plastic sheet to cover the ground or grass on which the exhibit will be placed. The exhibit occupies an outside space of 14' x 14'. Space will be assigned as Chapters arrive for setup.
6. Chapters should not label their landscape with their chapter name until after the exhibits are judged.
7. Chapters are responsible for the care of their landscape.
8. Exhibits may be constructed on the Tuesday & Wednesday (Animal Move-In Day) of fair week. Final touches to the exhibit must be in place by the first day of the fair at the time the fair opens to the public.

Hints for Landscape Design

- Barkdust should be pushed down.
- Each display needs an attractive border or line on its edges.
- All pots should be hidden and should not be mounded.
- Plans need to be drawn to scale. Consult Sunset's Landscaping Illustrated or Landscaping by Jack E. Ingels.
- Pay attention to details. For example, cover plastic tarps, and pool edges, and remove bark dust from plant foliage.
- Water, if used, should make noise.
- Do not overplant. Allow for some plant expansion.
- The plan should be adaptable to any backyard area. It should be developed for current & long-term aesthetics.

SECTION 12- AGRICULTURE MECHANICS

General Guidelines

1. A banner will be presented to the chapter earning the most points in the mechanic's division.
2. All shop entries must be the product of Agricultural Education students or active FFA members during the current year.
3. An Agricultural Mechanics committee of the Judges and Superintendents reviews projects as they are judged. The Committee will determine if projects meet standards.
4. Projects must be complete.
5. Projects may be shifted from one class to another at the discretion of the Section Superintendent.
6. When there are five or more projects of the same kind, a separate class may be created (for example, picnic tables).
7. Batteries to be disconnected from power-driven projects.
8. Chapter Advisors are responsible for delivery and marking their chapter shop display. 8. The Danish System is used in judging mechanics.
9. A Champion Rosette may be awarded in each Division and a Grand Champion Rosette for overall Divisions will be awarded.
